## Combined Tangata Whenua Forum – Terms of Reference Review

### Background

During the CTWF meeting on 4 May 2016, and after some discussion on the appointments process to SGIC, it was resolved that a small team would convene a workshop to review the Terms of Reference for the CTWF. The aim of the workshop was to clarify the appointments process and align other activities relevant to CTWF.

### Working Group

The Tu Pakari Advisor, SGIC governance members, and Maori Policy staff from each of the local and regional authorities met 11 May 2016 to review the CTWF Terms of Reference. The workshop made some consistency amendments to the document, and proposed a bi-monthly workshop (in the alternate month) to discuss topical issues in order to form a CTWF view/position. It was suggested, this approach would assist SmartGrowth by articulating a collective view/position on topical issues.

The other significant amendment to the Terms of Reference is the appointment of members from the CTWF to SGIC. The workshop also discussed stipulating a term for CTWF governance members. After some considerable discussion, it was agreed to present 2 options for CTWF to consider –

#### Option 1 – CTWF Representation to SGIC

- Representation from the CTWF to SGIC will consist of:
  - 1 member appointed by the Tauranga Moana Tangata Whenua Collective (TCC);
  - 1 member appointed by the Partnership Forums (WBOPDC);
  - 1 member appointed by the CTWF; and
  - the Mauao ward member elected to the BOPRC
- CTWF representatives to SGIC term will be 4 years and rotating on an annual basis and will align with local government elections, starting with the Mauao ward member, Partnership Forums appointee, CTWF appointee, and Tauranga Moana Tangata Whenua Collective appointee



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or

#### Option 2 – CTWF Representation to SGIC

- Representation from the CTWF to SGIC will consist of:
  - 1 member appointed by the Tauranga Moana Tangata Whenua Collective (TCC);
  - 1 member appointed by the Partnership Forums (WBOPDC);
  - 2 members appointed by the CTWF; and
- CTWF representatives to SGIC term will be 4 years and rotating on an annual basis starting with the Partnership Forums appointee, CTWF appointee (longest serving), Tauranga Moana Tangata Whenua Collective appointee, and CTWF appointee.

## Recommendations

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It is recommended that CTWF:

1. **Receive** this report; and
2. **Note** the changes made to the Terms of Reference; and
3. **Agree** to option 1; or
4. **Agree** to option 2
5. **Agree** to submit the amended Terms of Reference to SGIC for endorsement



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### 6.3 Combined Tangata Whenua Forum

#### Key Responsibilities:

- Have input into the development of the SmartGrowth strategies and implementation of actions from tangata whenua perspective.
- Support the implementation of the Strategy through an audit role and the provision of information and advice.
- Provide timely and effective feedback on implementation actions.
- Provide essential communication links to and from constituent iwi and hapu.
- Provide input into the appointment of a Tu Pakari Advisor in conjunction with SGIC chair and CTWF chair.
- Maintain links between Treaty settlement outcomes and strategy implementation.

#### Form:

- Membership comprising the Tauranga Moana Tangata whenua Collective (TCC) and iwi/hapu members of [Partnership Maori Forums](#) (WBOPDC).
- Meet at least six times a calendar year, generally on a bi-monthly basis.
- [Meet up to six times a calendar year, generally on a bi-monthly basis to workshop issues and topics of interest to the CTWF](#)
- Meeting attendance funded in a manner consistent with TCC and WBOPDC Council policy.
- Scope for members of the CTWF to be seconded to the Committee if required to provide insight into specific issues.
- Served by the Tu Pakari Advisor in respect of agendas, papers, and report preparation.
- Chair appointed by CTWF.

#### CTWF Representation to SGIC

- Representation from the CTWF to SGIC will consist of:
  - 1 member appointed by the [Tauranga Moana Tangata Whenua Collective \(TCC\)](#);
  - 1 member appointed by the [Partnership Forums \(WBOPDC\)](#);
  - 1 member appointed by the CTWF; and
  - the Mauao ward member elected to the BOPRC
- [CTWF representatives to SGIC term will be 4 years and rotating on an annual basis and aligning with local government elections for the Mauao ward, Partnership Forums appointee, CTWF appointee, and Tauranga Moana Tangata Whenua Collective appointee](#)

or

- Representation from the CTWF to SGIC will consist of:
  - 1 member appointed by the [Tauranga Moana Tangata Whenua Collective \(TCC\)](#);
  - 1 member appointed by the [Partnership Forums \(WBOPDC\)](#);
  - 2 members appointed by the CTWF; and
- [CTWF representatives to SGIC term will be 4 years and rotating on an annual basis starting with the Partnership Forums appointee, CTWF appointee \(longest serving\), Tauranga Moana Tangata Whenua Collective appointee, and CTWF appointee.](#)

#### Kia Tu Pakari ai Tatou:

- The CTWF will be responsible for ensuring the Rangatiratanga of the hapu and Iwi (tangata whenua values, principles, traditions and customs) are taken into account and maintained throughout the implementation of the strategy.
- The CTWF [provides-is](#) a reference group to support the future growth related needs of hapu and Iwi.

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### **Tangata whenua Audit:**

- An audit on the implementation of the strategy by the CTWF will be a key monitoring function for tangata whenua in assessing the outcomes of the strategy.

### **Tangata whenua Leadership**

- The collective knowledge and experience within the CTWF provides strong leadership and direction to the SmartGrowth Implementation decisions on specific and generic actions affecting tangata whenua.
- Tangata whenua will provide leadership in the implementation of some actions solely, shared as a member of the SmartGrowth Implementation Committee or as a support to other lead agencies.
- Tangata whenua engagement in the implementation and monitoring will provide confidence in the growth and development processes.

### **Communication and Liaison with Tangata whenua:**

- The CTWF provides a regional forum for hapu, Iwi and Maori to raise implementation issues. The use of Marae and specialist workshops has proven to be an effective communication tool in engaging tangata whenua. These internal networks and techniques should be utilised to ensure that momentum of the strategy is maintained.

### **Relationships:**

- CTWF participants are able to raise issues for discussion within the CTWF meetings to be taken to the SGIC and other forums by the tangata whenua representative and/or the Tu Pakari Advisor.
- The CTWF is able to develop issues/ recommendations that have not been solicited by the SGIC and present these to the committee.

### **Participation:**

- The CTWF will openly debate issues, with the opportunity for all participants to contribute. All meetings are open to whanau, hapu Iwi and Maori across the sub-region.

### **Autonomy:**

- The CTWF will consolidate and summarise all the knowledge and representations of the participating [organisationhapu and iwis](#).
- It is recognised that this knowledge will be based on personal/[organisationhapu and iwi](#) values and views.
- It is acknowledged that the CTWF participants will not always agree on issues.
- Any feedback/ recommendation to the SGIC will include all of the opinions and positions of the CTWF participants.
- CTWF participants will be able to present, in person, their differing views to the SGIC, to ensure their position is appropriately articulated.

### **Communication:**

- Communication between the CTWF and the SGIC will be either a formal written report or presentation [prepared by the Tu Pakari Advisor](#).
- A major focus of the communication between the two groups will be on building relationships, trust and honest interaction.

### **Operational Process:**

- Facilitation, Independent Chair to continue in this role.
- CTWF participants own the process and operation of the group so they must contribute to the running of the process.
- Participating [organisationhapu and iwis](#) will support each other to ensure equal opportunity to



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contribute.

- Open invitation for members of both the CTWF and SGIC to attend each others meetings.
- Alternate's representation is allowable.
- Alternate must come prepared for meetings and may not propose different [organisationhapu and iwai](#) agendas to those already raised by the usual representative.
- The CTWF will have access to copies of all the reports sent to the SGIC.

# Combined Tangata Whenua Forum – Monitoring Actions

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## Background

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The CTWF Terms of Reference notes that the CTWF have an audit function to monitor the implementation of the strategy, in particular the actions and activities that relate specifically to tangata whenua.

## CTWF Actions

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The following table is taken directly from the strategy. Actions in green are complete, yellow are current projects, blue are projects that are on-going, and the remainder are yet to start. It is proposed to include this table as a standard CTWF agenda item to monitor and track progress on strategy actions. Some actions require urgent, short term (3 years) and medium term (5 years) responses.

### Active Actions

- 11A4 – Combined Consultation Policy  
Local and regional authority consents and Maori Policy teams have met to identify review workshop material and issues identified from by CTWF and PDF. Consents and Maori Policy staff are developing a range of responses to the issues raised by the CTWF and PDF. It is proposed to present these responses to a joint workshop of CTWF and PDF in September.
- 11C1 – Supplementary Demographic Report  
The Supplementary Demographic scoping report has been received and agreed by SGIMG. The Tu Pakari Advisor will be preparing a draft report for CTWF consideration in September.

## CTWF Position Paper

### Background

The Settlement Pattern Review was adopted by SGIC at its September 2014 meeting. The objective of the Settlement Pattern Review is:

*to determine the temporal and spatial blueprint for allocating residential and industrial growth within the western bay over the next 30 years whilst retaining a 50 year strategic horizon*

The fora are invited to present, and have recorded, their sectors:

- requirements regarding the provision of social infrastructure and placemaking;
- desired outcomes especially from the compact city provisions (noting that these provisions are more likely to be effective on a larger scale in greenfield developments); and
- any other position statements they would like to make regarding their sector in the western Bay of Plenty.

There is a tight timeframe facing SmartGrowth to provide this information so that it can be lodged in time to be included in the proposed adoption of the Settlement Pattern Review in August. A hui of all fora is proposed for 12 July with the SmartGrowth partners to receive the position papers and then determine how elements are captured and integrated into the Settlement Pattern Review.



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## Draft CTWF Position Paper

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A CTWF position paper was drafted by the Tu Pakari Advisor. A small working group was convened to review the draft before submission to the CTWF. The paper draws on the Aspirational Plan prepared by the CTWF in 2012 and feedback received during the Social Infrastructure Workshop in November last year and the Social Infrastructure Rangatahi Workshop run at Maungatapu Marae in April 2016.

The feedback from the workshops seems to focus on tangata whenua seeing themselves reflected in the environment. Many urban spaces feel quite foreign as other values become superimposed over underlying tangata whenua values.

*“tangata whenua want to see ourselves reflected in the built environment.”*

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## CTWF Position Paper July 2016

### 1. Purpose

To present the position statement of the SmartGrowth Combined Tangata Whenua Forum (CTWF) regarding the sector requirements when considering accommodating growth within the western Bay of Plenty sub-region

### 2. SmartGrowth Implementation Committee (SGIC) recommendations

- That the position of the CTWF is noted
- That SmartGrowth and the partner staff respond to the points in all future reporting regarding the SPR
- That the future stages of planning incorporate, where feasible, the outcomes sought and when deemed not appropriate or feasible an explanation provided.

### 3. Background

The rights and interests of Maori are preserved by the Treaty of Waitangi. Principles of partnership, active protection, good faith, self-determination and consultation are foundational to the relationship between Maori and non-Maori. The SmartGrowth partnership is unique in that it recognises the role of tangata whenua in the sub-region and provides opportunities for active engagement and participation at the governance and management and operational levels of the partnership.

The Aspirational Plan 2012 prepared by the CTWF provides a useful context and background when considering a position on the Settlement Pattern Review. The Plan was prepared to assist tangata whenua to respond in a meaningful and consistent manner to a range of proposals, activities, policy directions and strategies and plans in the western Bay of Plenty. The Plan articulates broad cultural, social, environmental, economic and political aspirations of tangata whenua. The aspirations are underpinned by the Treaty of Waitangi and informed by principles of mana, whanaungatanga, ahi kaa, and kaitiakitanga. The Plan notes among others the following aspirations:

- exercise of customary and traditional practices,
- recognise diversity and shared identity,
- embrace new arrivals,
- awareness of tangata whenua identity,
- protection of ancestral places,
- fairness, equality and justice,
- access to social and community services,
- te reo is spoken,



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- housing options to meet lifestyle and lifecycle need,
- development of a museum,
- retention and improved utilisation of Maori land,
- co-governance and co-management of resources,
- protection of kaimoana resources,
- use of matauranga Maori in environmental management,
- develop improved solutions for wastewater and stormwater,
- completion of Treaty Settlements,
- full employment,
- retention and utilisation of Maori land and resources,
- equal representation on local authorities,
- strong leadership,
- communities are informed,
- developing partnerships with local government and Crown agencies.

The overwhelming view of the CTWF is that:

*“tangata whenua want to see ourselves reflected in the built environment.”*

#### 4. Critical factors for consideration for the settlement pattern review

The following critical CTWF factors for considerations are grouped under broad principles of Rangatiratanga and Mana, Whanaungatanga, Tipuranga, and Kaitiakitanga. Many of the elements promoted by the CTWF are encouraged and while they instil a sense of place, connectedness, cohesion, context, character and custodianship from a Maori perspective they will inevitably echo some of the same sentiments of the other partnership forums.

##### ***Rangatiratanga/Mana – power, authority, control, recognition and self-determination***

- Ensure the protection of cultural sites and areas of significant cultural value. Where appropriate, celebrate and memorialise those areas to ensure we don't forget events, activities or narratives associated with places
- Ensure community and /or street names reflect traditional names of areas to assist with the retention and maintenance of traditional narratives, events, ancestors
- Secured access to cultural sites and areas of significant cultural value on public lands to enable connections and relationships to be maintained
- Provision and protection of view shafts from public spaces. View shafts provide opportunities to make landscape connections to important iconic features – maunga, awa, moana

##### ***Whanaungatanga – social connections and networks***

- Provide opportunities for community gatherings, civic and public spaces where people can connect, recreate and relate



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- Consider community civic centre/marae for events and/or community or private functions
- Provision of affordable housing through varied housing sizes and typologies?
- Provide for mixed housing typologies to cater for lifestyle and lifecycle – young families to the elderly
- Mixed use in commercial centres that create vibrant community centres
- Provisions for inter-generational housing that accommodate families with grandparents
- Encourage mixed communities types, from young families, families with teens, empty nesters, to retired and elderly
- Design communities in a way that facilitate community interaction and connections
- Communal areas for interactions and connections
- CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) principles integrated into the design of urban spaces to improve community safety and connectedness
- Connect urban and natural spaces for amenity and recreation
- Consider educational choice for the community, particularly kohanga reo, rumaki reo and wharekura (based on demand)
- Encourage walking, cycling and public transport patronage within communities rather than the use of private vehicles
- Create walkable communities with good access to commercial areas, amenities, social and cultural spaces
- Provide for active recreational spaces for traditional sporting activities – waka ama, kiorahi, rugby, soccer, netball, basketball, swimming, skating

### ***Tipuranga – development***

- Consider Maori land as an opportunity rather than a risk or imposition to development
- Consideration of Maori land as an opportunity for potential growth area
- Consider alternative land tenure arrangements on Maori land that seek to maximise the development opportunities
- Opportunities for free wifi access within the community and public spaces

### ***Kaitiakitanga – stewardship and guardianship***

- Provide linkages and connections between natural spaces and urban spaces
- Encourage the use of native plant species in public spaces rather than exotic, native will create ecological corridors into the hinterland
- Also consider where appropriate in public spaces, fruit trees or produce trees to encourage active use of passive recreational spaces, community and communal garden space
- Consider the restoration of coastal and/or waterway margins to improve native ecology and biodiversity
- Protect and provide access for cultural harvesting in coastal and waterway areas
- Continually seek and promote where appropriate innovative solutions to wastewater and stormwater collection, treatment and disposal
- Encourage recycle and reuse options for rainwater





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**5. Specific outcomes the Combined Tangata Whenua are seeking:**

***Ko te whenua ko au, ko au ko te whenua – I am the land and the land is me***

- SmartGrowth to prepare cultural urban design guidelines to be used by both the local authorities and developers to encourage the integration of cultural design elements into our urban environments, both green and brown fields
- Promote and encourage the use of the Te Aranga Urban Design Principles – Auckland Council, as a means of capturing the underlying cultural values and principles associated with place. Those principles are then used to guide developments through good urban design practice
- Ensure CPTED principles are utilised and regularly audited in the design of public spaces
- Encourage opportunities for public private partnerships with Maori landowners and/or iwi organisations
- Support the Proposed National Policy Statement on Urban Development Capacity, which requires local authorities to undertake regular (3 yearly) housing assessments



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## PAPER E

### Combined Tangata Whenua Forum Communications Strategy

#### Background

The combined forum members represent the iwi and hapū of the western Bay of Plenty subregion and meet bimonthly to discuss SmartGrowth matters related to tangata whenua. One of the challenges is to ensure that iwi and hapū members are kept informed of the key discussion and action points from Forum and other SmartGrowth meetings.

This strategy sets out ways to help develop stronger two-way communications between forum members and their constituent iwi and hapū.

#### Communications goal

Iwi and hapu members have easy access to SmartGrowth information and actions and have opportunities to express their views through their forum representatives

#### Objectives

- **80% of forum members regularly keep their iwi / hapū members informed about SmartGrowth matters**
- **All forum members regularly raise topics at forum meetings that have been brought to them by iwi / hapū members**

#### Tactics

##### Panui

After every forum meeting, the Tu Pakiri advisor produces a panui for distribution to iwi and hapū members via their forum representatives. The panui will summarise the key messages from the forum discussion and also include other relevant SmartGrowth information.

##### Social media

SmartGrowth social media channels (Facebook, Twitter and LinkedIn) are used to spread information about tangata whenua matters and are promoted amongst iwi / hapū members

### Radio

Bi-monthly radio spot on Moana AM from the Tu Pakiri Advisor following the forum meetings and talking about the matters that were discussed

### Website

The SmartGrowth website [www.smartgrowthbop.org.nz](http://www.smartgrowthbop.org.nz) is currently being rebuilt and the new version should be live in August 2016. This provides an opportunity for forum members to access information easily through the general website and a section for tangata whenua

### Connections to runanga communications

Send regular SmartGrowth updates to the runanga for distribution through their panui and websites

### SmartGrowth newsletter

The bimonthly SmartGrowth newsletter will contain items of interest for tangata whenua and should be shared with iwi / hapū members

### Rangatahi engagement

Annual hui (such as the one held recently) for rangatahi to discuss future options for Tauranga moana

### Evaluation

The objectives will be reviewed annually at the end of each year to measure:

- **The percentage of forum members who regularly keep their iwi / hapū members informed of SmartGrowth matters**
- **The percentage of forum members who raise issues at forum meetings that were brought to them by iwi / hapū members**
